

We, in the Block Watch family, Vista Heights and Mayland Heights will miss you very much.



Do You Have a Drug House in Your Neighbourhood

A message from the Federation of Calgary Communities

Drug houses don't just happen in other neighbourhoods. There are drug houses in all types of neighbourhoods. "Drug houses" are homes that are used for the production of illegal drugs, such as methamphetamines, marijuana, and cocaine. **Due to the hazardous chemicals used and the fire hazards posed, drug houses are a serious threat to the community.**

Drug dealers look for locations where neighbours do not communicate and isolate themselves. This makes it easy to intimidate those neighbours that do notice drug activity. Drug dealers like neighbourhoods that say, "It can't happen here."

How can you identify a drug house in your neighbourhood?

Most drug houses have similar identifying characteristics. Watch for the following:

- Strange Odours. Smells to be aware of include ammonia, acetone, acid, and solvents.
- Frequent and Unusual Traffic Flow stop, enter, leave. Watch for frequent visits by different cars, at any time of the day or night. Be suspicious of vehicles with obscured or absent license plates. Watch for excessive foot traffic to and from the house or property and loitering in or around the house.
- **Property Alteration.** This includes covering windows and patio doors with items other than curtains or drapes, barricading windows and doors, and disconnecting fire alarms.
- **Bright Interior Lights.** High-intensity 1000-watt lamps are commonly used in the production of methamphetamines and cannabis.
- Constant Humming Noises like that of a fan, or a transformer on a hydro pole
- **Tenants Who Own Expensive Items,** especially if they appear to be unemployed. Expensive cars, cell phones, home entertainment systems, etc.
- Extensive Security Measures, beyond typical home security. This includes fencing, guard dogs, lookouts, etc.
- Little Property Maintenance. Unkempt yard, little to no furniture.
- Increased Noise and Crimes. Loud voices, fights, gunfire, radios, especially at night. Increase in crimes like auto burglaries, robbery, vandalism, and assault, as well as active prostitution in or around the neighbourhood.



Do You Have a Drug House in Your Neighbourhood cont.

A message from the Federation of Calgary Communities

Prevention is the best way to stop drug houses!

You can reduce the chance that a drug house moves into your neighbourhood. Meet and get to know your neighbours and your Police Community Liaison Officers. As problems develop in the neighbourhood, work with law enforcement to resolve them quickly.

What should you do if you suspect a drug house in your neighbourhood?

- **Communication is key.** Talk to anyone and everyone: neighbours, the police, the SCAN Unit (Safer Communities and Neighbourhoods), local Crime Stoppers, anyone in the government who can help you get rid of the drug house. You will not solve the problem yourself the only way to shut down a drug house is through teamwork.
- **Keep records.** Set up a calendar and a log to take down license plate numbers, car color and make of suspicious vehicles, date and time of activity. Record the time and date of incidents surrounding the drug house, such as shots fired, screaming, burglaries, vandalism, etc. Report this information to the police.
- **Be patient.** Police have to work within the law, and so do you. It may take time to gather enough evidence to shut down the drug operation legally,

so don't be discouraged.

Safer Communities and Neighbourhoods (SCAN)

What is SCAN?

The Safer Communities and Neighbourhoods (SCAN) unit makes communities safer by using civil legislation to target residential and commercial problem properties in rural and urban Alberta where specified illegal activity is occurring regularly. This includes drug activity, prostitution and gangrelated crime.

SCAN holds owners accountable for activity taking place on their property and supports landlords by helping them remove problem tenants who disrupt neighbourhoods and destroy property.

A resource for communities across Alberta, the unit initiates investigations based on citizen tips and works in partnership with residents to increase safety.

How does SCAN work?

When a community member reports a problem property to SCAN, the unit will begin an investigation. Once the investigation confirms the activity investigators will contact the property owner to try and solve the problem informally.

If informal efforts are unsuccessful, SCAN can apply to the courts for a Community Safety Order (CSO) that calls for owners to meet a number of conditions, or for the property to be closed for up to 90 days.

SCAN uses civil legislation to target properties, not people. Any criminal activity uncovered when dealing with these properties is turned over to the police to investigate.

What are the signs I can look for in my neighbourhood?

The following are common signs of suspicious or illegal activity. Observing one of the following doesn't always signal illegal activity but if they occur frequently or together, a problem may exist.

Signs to look for include:

residents that are rarely seen, distant or secretive

frequent visitors and unusual traffic at any time of the day or night

people repeatedly visiting the property who only go to the door for short durations

increased vehicle or foot traffic frequent late-night activity windows blackened or curtains always drawn extensive investment in home security neglected property and yard presence of drug paraphernalia or strange odours coming from the property residents who regularly meet vehicles near the property for short periods of time

If you are suspicious of a property, do not investigate it yourself or approach the occupants. Contact local police or SCAN.

Is there a property in your community where illegal activities may be occurring? Take action to improve the safety of your community by contacting SCAN.

How do I file a complaint?

Call SCAN toll-free at 1-866-960-SCAN (7226). You can also file a complaint online at alberta.ca/report-suspiciousproperty.aspx.

If enough evidence exists to support the complaint, SCAN will investigate.



Park cart smart

When you set out your blue, green and black carts properly, you're helping to ensure safe and efficient operation of The City's waste collection trucks. That includes how you park on the street outside your home, especially in cul-de-sacs. A few simple reminders will help make everyone's day go smoothly:

• Parking in a cul-de-sac: All vehicles must be parallel parked with passenger side wheels to the curb, unless there are signs permitting

angle parking. This helps collection trucks reach your carts and turn \ around in a cul-de-sac

 Place your carts on flat ground, one metre away from your vehicle if parked on the street. Improperly parked vehicles block driveways for residents and restrict access for emergency and waste management vehicles.



• Parking in an alley: Do not block the end of a closed alley with parked vehicles. Collection trucks need space to turn around safely.

Calgary Transit Introduces Weekend Group Passes

Beginning this April 15, Calgary Transit will be offering a new weekend group day pass for customers.

This new pass is targeted to groups and families traveling together, who don't use transit regularly, but could benefit from discounted transit fares to attend events and activities on weekends. The price of the weekend group day pass is \$15 and it is valid for unlimited travel on a weekend day for groups of up to five people including up to two adults.

"We know that for a lot of families or groups traveling together, the price to get around can really add up," says Councillor Kourtney Penner. "This discounted fare will make it easier for them to choose transit to get where they're going."

The price of this pass offers savings versus the cost if the individuals were to buy single ride tickets or multiple day passes at the regular rates. And unlike a single ride ticket, the group pass is valid all day – until the end of service.

"There's always so much happening in Calgary on weekends and this pass is a great opportunity for groups to save on regular transit costs, or on the cost and hassle of driving, parking and navigating through traffic," Penner says.

After April 15, the weekend group day pass will be available every weekend on My Fare, the Transit trip planning app, or from ticket vending machines at CTrain stations.

Emergency Medical Services



Window & Balcony Safety

With the return of warmer weather, Emergency Medical Services (EMS) would like to remind parents and caregivers of an often-overlooked hazard in the home – access to open windows. Every year, paramedics respond to emergencies where a child has fallen from an open window, often from the second floor. These can be mitigated by following safety measures. Take the time to assess potential window and balcony hazards in your home before a preventable fall occurs.

Windows and screens

- Prevent access to windows by moving furniture such as cribs, beds, stools, and change tables out from under them;
- Keep drapery cords out of childrens' reach. Wrap excess cord around cleats, or tie-downs to avoid a choking hazard;
- Remember, screens are not safety devices. They are designed to keep bugs out, not children in.

Balconies

- Do not underestimate a child's ability to climb. Furniture and other items stored on balconies and decks can be used to climb resulting in falls over the railing;
- Ensure that your balcony railings are not more than 10 cm (4 inch) apart. This will eliminate access between the vertical bars of a balcony, or deck.

Further prevention tips

- Toddlers & preschoolers are at highest risk of falling from a window, or balcony, but it may happen at any age;
- Direct supervision of children is the single most effective way to prevent falls from windows and balconies;
- Install safety devices which limit the distance in which a window be can open to a maximum of 10cm (4 inches);
- Ensure the safety device can be released quickly, so the window can be used for escape in case of emergency.
- Consider purchasing a portable air conditioner, which will enable windows to stay closed & secure.
